Compensatory Time - A non-exempt/salaried employee will only receive "compensatory time" for any hours worked in excess of the employee's regular scheduled workweek if the overtime is first approved in writing by the employee's Department Head. The employee will be credited with the equivalent of striate time for all such authorized excess time worked up to forty hours in a given work week. The employee will be credited with the equivalent of time and one-half for all authorized time worked over forty hours in a given work week. An employee may accumulate a maximum of 15 hours in compensatory time credits. All compensatory time credits must be used within 30 days of when they are received. Unused time credits after 30 days will be forfeited.

Joey's Wish Inc.

Joey's Wish is a legacy nonprofit that honors an amazing man whose life was taken by addiction. Devastated and unwilling to sit back and let these abusive substances continue to take the lives of the next generations to come, Joey's friends and family have vowed to raise as much money and awareness as possible to fund the research that will stop addiction at its source in the human brain. Below is a story written by Joey's older sister that explains our heart and mission.

It's been a little over a month since I have unexpectedly lost my brother to a drug overdose at the age of 24. Trying to live my life and function normally day to day through the pain radiating through my body feels unreal and unfair. People are smiling and laughing, and life is going on all around me meanwhile my life feels as though it's unraveling and falling apart. It makes me wonder how many other people I encounter daily that are silently suffering. Statistics show that depression and anxiety are rapidly increasing in our country each year. That thought quickly reminds me to try and be more kind and compassionate to those around me because my pain is invisible which means so is theirs.

Majority of people are not compassionate to those suffering with substance abuse disorders unless they have personally known or lost someone to the battle even though it is now considered the number one killer in the United States. Drugs are taking away our youth and the next generation before their time and contributions can be made to the world. The choices that drug users make affect not only themselves, but their family, friends, and in turn our neighborhoods, our workplaces, our societies and the culture at large. With this knowledge, we can argue that there is not enough research being done to help

break the cycle of addiction. While we are and should be thankful to the many mental health and addiction services that are currently making great contributions to the lives that are polluted, there is a disconnect with scientifically trying to "cure" or break the addiction cycle at the root before death does it for us.

My brother was a vibrant young man whose smile and blue eyes could light up a room. Those eyes often helped to get him out of trouble growing up, but they couldn't save him from his addiction. As he got older and began experimenting with drugs to help cope with his depression and anxiety our family became increasingly frustrated. Drugs were not a part of our family culture and none of us could understand why that was the path he chose. I have learned that everyone deals with pain and trauma in their own way. For Joey, drugs numbed or made the pain disappear for a while and ultimately isn't that what we all want for our lives? To be free of pain and suffering? I believe it is. While I do not condone or agree with the methods he chose to deal with his pain, I can understand them. He was human and he was hurting. The danger lied in the seductive pull and sense of temporary relief they must have offered to keep him coming back for more. Which he did and so do so many others. I know my brother did not want to die. That it



was truly an accident. In efforts to numb his pain one night, in one moment, he did not know it was going to be his last. That is what drugs do,

they take. Drugs took my brother's life away, both while he was alive and now that he is gone. They took away a son, a grandson, a brother, an uncle, a nephew, and a friend. With drugs there is no expecting death or having the ability to say goodbye or give last words to make sure they knew you loved them through it all anyway. While my body is filled with anguish, agony, anger, heartache, and complete brokenness at the thought of spending the majority of what is left of my life without my brother, I ask you to rally around him, around my family, and the many others in our country that are affected by this growing epidemic that is taking away so many of our loved ones. It's time for us to stand up as a society and a culture and support those struggling with addiction before it's too late.

My mother uses the analogy of a light switch. For drug users, once they get addicted to something and the light switch gets flipped to the "on" position, it's nearly impossible to flip that switch back "off." It can be turned into a dimmer switch for the over-comers, the lucky ones, the ones who can break the cycle and the chains and the seductive pull. The ones who can come out of rehab changed and on the other side of it all. The cravings may never fully disappear, but they can overcome them, ignore them, and put their thoughts and actions to more healthy ways of coping. However the light switch is always there and can currently never be put back into the off position. Users can always still be susceptible to relapses, hospitalizations etc.

My brother couldn't flip his light switch to the off position in time before the drugs chose to do it for him. And while my family has to live with that pain for the rest of our lives, it has become our personal mission to create a fund at the Upstate Foundation in my brother's honor to help others avoid the same pain and outcome. Joey wished that he didn't have anxiety. He wished he didn't have depression. And we know he wished not to have a drug addiction. Therefore, The Joey's Wish Func aims to raise awareness, funds, and in the future, contribute to the research that seeks to turn off the light switch once and fo all in the human brain and break the addiction cycle at the source. So, we ask you, please contribute and help us turn off the light.

This story is becoming all too common in families across the world. You may know all too well the pain that our hearts have been stricken with or you may know someone who has. You may fear for your own loved ones that addiction may engulf them one day. Please rally with us and donate to Joey's Wish, Inc to help start our journey to end this terrible crisis. It is interpreted by this department that the viability of farm operations is protected especially with the smaller farms and enforcement will not be a response to the signs.
